Harriet's home continues to keep us busy and out of trouble. The furnace that heats and cools the Library, Parlor, and Dining Room decided to quit working. Parts are no longer available for the furnaces. Phillips Heating was contacted and a new furnace and air conditioning unit has been installed at a cost of \$11,500. The house has four units and the unit that serves the back portion of the downstairs will not make it through the winter. This too will have to be replaced probably sometime in October/November.

The front porch pillar bases were badly rotted. Three out of four bases have been replaced and by Spring of next year, the last one will be replaced.

A portion of the decorative fence by the lower terrace was damaged and the panel needs to be replaced. Hopefully, this can be accomplished this Fall after the poison ivy dies. Spraying has begun to kill the ivy along with other unneeded growth on the fence.

WOMEN'S PARK UPDATE

The Women's Park is again in the spotlight celebrating 20 years since ground was broken in March 2003 and dedicated in June 2003. The idea for the Women's Park came from the Upton Board of Directors led by Curator Lana Eisenbraun. The Park was intended to honor women from past and present as a gift to the city of Warren and Trumbull County in celebration of Ohio's Bicentennial.

Through fund-raising efforts headed by Kay Fisher, money was donated from area businesses, organizations, and individuals. Sue Herman implemented the plans for the Park and oversaw its development and expansion for several years. In 2008, the statue to represent all women was installed.

Although the Park is city property, the Upton Association finances the Park through fund-raisers and wonderful community support. Park Chairman, Marti Flint organizes the dedicated volunteers who plant, weed, and water the flowers, maintain the lily pond and care for the fish.

In 2022, the beautiful water feature was upgraded. Ken Conklin replaced hundreds of newly engraved bricks through the past several years.

The Park was honored on June 25 as Mayor Franklin and about forty other friends met to celebrate and enjoy the surroundings. Mayor Franklin said, "This Park is truly one of the city's best gifts. It is a park that celebrates women."

Anna Eleanor Roosevelt was the longest serving first lady of the United States, a United Nations (UN) spokeswoman and an activist who worked tirelessly in advancing human rights. She wrote her own daily news column on equality for women in journalism. She held press conferences for women reporters only. She served on the board of the NAACP and the Congress of Racial Equality. She went on to be appointed to the UN General Assembly where she worked to draft the Universal Declaration of Human Rights which was ratified in 1945.

Upton Dues to Increase


